Families are families, and who knows how much longer they will prevent, hide, confuse.

Palermo, summer 1942. On his deathbed, Baron Enrico Sorci sees the recent history of his family pass before his eyes, as if in a lucid delirium. He sees the devotion of his wife, his daughters Maria Teresa, Anna and Lia, his sons Cola, Ludovico, Filippo and Andrea, but he also sees the bastards, and at the same time the destiny of a city that at the turn of the century was shining with opportunity and new wealth, with trains arriving laden with goods. We are fragile, and we are imperfect. Imperfect is the world, not love. And we embroider, we continue to embroider, with love.

Andrea Sorci, in a fit of rage, kills his 'continental' maid. The murder is covered up by Baron Sorci's illegitimate son, the very powerful Peppe Vallo, otherwise known as the Americano. Rico, Andrea's nephew, who knows but does not speak, is a tormented man, disillusioned by the wounded post-war Sicily: he lives next door to Rita, whom he loves and cannot help but betray. Yet something is moving: three women, the aunts the Sorcis have renamed 'the Three Wise Women', found the Circolo del Punto Pieno (Full Stitch Circle) in the sacristy of the Santi Scalzi church, where they embroider layettes, tablecloths, sheets, towels. From the noblewoman to the nun of the house, to the prostitute, in that 'feverish jubilation of the fingers' a sort of women's gathering is formed where they discuss, comment, console each other, offer hope for change and mend social and family traumas. It is a new sisterhood based on a 'separation from the world outside that only women, when together, are able to create and defend'. Meanwhile, however, man flies to the moon, students rebel. And the positive tension of the movements at the turn of the sixties and seventies clashes with the contradictions of the island.



A story that unfolds from the unusual Sicilian family to more recent travels with their son George and grandchildren, discovering the treasures of our artistic heritage and the architectural barriers that limit access to them.

When one is born into an unusual family such as Simonetta Agnello Hornby's, from an early age one grows up with the awareness that one is "all normal, but different, each with their own characteristics, sometimes a little 'strange'". Through a series of savoury and affectionate portraits, we thus make the acquaintance of cousin Ninì, deaf-mute ("Ninì doesn't speak well", she explains to strangers), of the beloved Hungarian nanny Giuliana, a bit lame, of the father with a bad leg and of the 'pinched' great-aunt Rosina, a kleptomaniac - when the silverware disappears from the table, the relatives sneak up on her to take the cutlery out of her pockets, slowly, without her noticing, because 'the aunt must not feel embarrassed'. And then, of course, we get to know George, both through his mother's words and through his voice, which alternates as an ironic (one hundred per cent British) but firm counter-song in recounting the many obstacles of those who move around in wheelchairs. And just as Simonetta with her stories of a bygone era gives us an unusual and genuine look at the world, so too George, who was diagnosed with multiple sclerosis fifteen years ago, gives us a different point of view from which to observe the cities we live in, the people around us and ourselves.


A few kilometres from Agrigento, near the Rupe Atenea, there is Mosé, Baron Agnello's country residence, a large farmhouse with its own chapel and barns, set among olive groves and fallow fields. Three families of peasants live at Mosé in winter, only at the end of May does the owner, the Baroness and her daughters, Chiara and Simonetta, join them, along with all the service staff of course: maids, cooks, seamstresses and nannies.

In the summer of 1950, Simonetta rediscovered the intense flavours and fragrances of Sicily in the large family kitchen, thanks to the work of Rosalia, who is the true mistress of Moses, wife of the campiere Vincenzo Vella and mother of his nine children. Rosalia bakes bread every week, for herself and for all the farm labourers, she sets the work shifts for the other women, she bakes focaccias stuffed with olives and rosemary for all the children, she prepares the 'caffè d'u parrinu' for distinguished guests, she preserves in her skilful hands all the art and tradition of her land.

But the Baroness also expresses the best of her passions in the large patronal kitchen. In the early afternoon, while the servants are resting, she and her sister 'Teresù' churn out sponge cakes, biscuits, shortcrust pastries, kneading the genuine ingredients that the countryside has never skimped on, not even in wartime. In a five-month-long merry-go-round, made up of continuous visits from friends and relatives, against the backdrop of an agrarian reform that promised the peasants land and threatened the barons with expropriation, Simonetta Agnello Hornby, with the precious help of her sister Chiara, recovers the recipes that were made then and are still made today in Moses' great kitchen. Twenty-eight summer dishes, all based on the vegetables of the season, but also many classic desserts of the Sicilian tradition, in which Chiara Agnello reveals all the secrets of a successful recipe and even the secret ingredient that no chef would ever dare reveal. Just as naturally, Simonetta and Costanza came to discover that those 'little reasons' could well be housed in the cosy shell of what, in the Sicilian linguistic heritage, sounds like *cuntintizza*. Here, then, is this fascinating duet that, with a wealth of episodes and family memories, evokes the subtle pleasure of rolling a ball of sugar and coffee, the sensuality of sinking one's hands into shortcrust pastry, the comfort of that 'just enough' that dwells in recipes, the yearning with which one caresses the object that belonged to a person who has passed away, the wonder that unfolds in the pointed blades of the prickly pear, the delicate cascade of coloured goblets, glasses and shot glasses. An example of *cuntintizza*? Here it is.

This is the story of two friends, two mothers, two wives. We are between Sciacca and Pertuso Piccione, in western Sicily. Giovanni and Santino have both dreamed of a sweet redemption, between Gagarin's flight, American cinema and the beauty of the country where they live. Giovanni has to satisfy his mother Cettina's social ambitions, Santino wants to save his mother Assunta from the dubious fate to which she has exposed herself in order to support the family. What will happen to us when we grow up? And what does it mean to grow up? What kind of men will we be? They have no time to give themselves answers: they are progressively absorbed by closed deals over their heads. Santino becomes a concrete prince, accepting ever richer and ever more manoeuvred orders. Giovanni, a lawyer, recommended by ambiguous and powerful figures, puts his skills as a lawman at the service of those who use the law to conceal the advantage of the few against the need of the many. They both make good marriages and triumph in the dark eighties, the terrible years of the mafia wars. Anna, a committed lawyer, specialised in water law, would like to 'save' Giovanni, married to the rich Veronica. Margherita, a devoted wife, assures Santino a family life that seems safe from blood and violence. But the building industry, public and private, allows neither transparency nor justice and the two friends are sucked into a hopeless spiral. Only the glimmers of adolescence and Assunta's dazzling beauty remain, embodiments of a dreamed Sicily that never stops dreaming its own good. Simonetta Agnello Hornby's is not only a novel about a mafia that may not shoot but governs the island's economy, it is above all a story about the fierce power of the family and the yearning desire to return to the land in which identity and hope are rooted.

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
